# **Weighted Probability Frequencies**

Frequency tables show response distribution across the full range of response options for each question. In these tables, the “Frequency” column shows the number of survey respondents who selected the corresponding answer. The “Percent” column reflects the percentage of respondents who selected each answer category among the total number of respondents. This includes missing responses—both non-substantive answer categories that have been designated as missing (e.g., “Don’t know”, “Not sure,” “Prefer not to say”) as well as system missing (i.e., blank responses). The “Valid Percent” column reflects the percentage of respondents who selected each answer category among the total number of respondents who provided a substantive answer to the question. In other words, the valid percent calculation excludes missing cases from the denominator. Unless otherwise noted, percentages presented in the narrative report reflect the valid percentages.

The data presented in these tables are based on responses from the probability sample only. The data have been weighted with base weights and post-stratification weights.

In these tables, the percentages reflect percent within each demographic affiliation that selected the corresponding answer. For example, 80% of respondents who have resided in Virginia Beach for less than 5 years are registered to vote in the City of Virginia Beach. In contrast, 99% of respondents who have resided in Virginia Beach for 25 years or longer are registered to vote in the City of Virginia Beach. Rows formatted in bold indicate the relationship between variables is statistically significant at the 95% level of confidence.

When reading these tables, it is important to note the distinction between blank cells and cells with "0" counts. The weighted n in some cells in the table can be less than 1. When a "0" count is shown, that indicates the weighted n has been rounded down to zero. When a cell is blank, there are no cases at all in that cell. The "w%" column indicates the weighted percentage of respondents who answered a particular way, within categories displayed across the top of the table.

The data presented in these tables are based on responses from the probability sample only. The data have been weighted with base weights and post-stratification weights.

i feel my interests will be well looked after, but i do have concerns that the districts have disparate socio-economic representation. Yes, the same number of voters may be in the borders, but does each district's representative actually have the socio-economic interests in mind for all constituents? Or will "traditional" political backing still push candidates to ballot in a similar fashion when three are "at-large" council (illegible).
I feel that I am better served by being able to elect someone that is closest to my issues and concerns that the person elected will take those issues to Council and see to it that they are addressed. I found at the Weldon Cooper Meetings that all felt the same way despite differences in age, race and gender.
I feel that I wasn't made aware of the district system. I feel gerrymandering is the most anti-democratic problem in this country. So, I would like to have known more about the districts and how the lines were drawn. Non-partisan experts should be selected in a bipartisan way to fairly draw all district lines throughout the country. Look how unfairly North Carolina is drawn, for example. The gerrymandering is obvious with a democratic governor and solidly republican congress.
I feel that the 10-1 system allows the residents of a particular district to elect their representative rather than having input from areas of the Beach whose priorities may be different.
I feel that the districts should not be changed to favor a certain political party.
I feel the 10-1 is mostly superior to the previous system. The 10-1 helps to prevent a "good old boys" block of council members who run the city.
I feel the new districts better represent the consent of the population. The old districts weren't balanced. I am interested to know how these districts project into the future and how well the boundaries hold up to future development and potential population growth and maturity.

Virginia Beach is the second most diverse city in the United States and we pretty much work, play, and shop together regardless of race or ethnicity. That is why the Special Master had to group disparate minority groups together to achieve the court mandate. Although there is value to majority minority districts, I believe the demographics of the city should determine the number and size of these districts and not some arbitrary mandate by a court.

These elected officials get to vote on all issues, but are only accountable to small electorate. Their votes are easy to be bought by developers. I would say that every bill has a component from one of these categories.When I confronted a member of the city council about conflict of interest within the council I was told that if there was any that person would not vote. if this was really the case no votes would ever be cast. The new system has the potential of being fairer and bringing in new ideas/ new blood. Creating a more rounded city council not a buddy system. In the last year since the implementation of the Court's 10-1 system, we have had FIVE Black City Council members, the same number in one year as we achieved in five decades under the 7-3-1 system: Delceno Miles (appointed in August 2022), Christopher Taylor, Dr. Amelia Ross-Hammond (finally re-elected under the new 10-1 system), Jennifer Rouse, and Sabrina Wooten.

Have city wide elections: forget the rest. If you want more minorities , appoint them. I believe if a council candidate is good, they will get elected regardless of race.
Honestly, I don't believe a referendum would be a great idea. Previous city referenda have been filled with misinformation and one on the election methods would run into the same problems. Likely, moneyed interests would push for whatever method would give them the most influence and not what is the most democratic. I think if the majority of people didn't like the 10-1 system they would sure let the city know - they are not shy. when there is a pattern of that type of behavior I pay attention.</p>

The 10-1 keeps the representation more even than the prior plan that favored special interests with deeper pockets allowing them the financial resources to be able to campaign countywide, at a disadvantage to a regular candidate who can contribute to VB but does not have the financial resources to compete.</p>

Why would I want a system whereby the voters in my district elect our representatives by our vote, but loses because of votes outside of my district. <p>I each district should have a group of citizens and a UVA group rep presenting a non partisan overview of the various election format possibilities.</p>
<p>I fear that a referendum would be politicized and not given with full information to citizens. I do favor Ranked Choice Voting and would like to see City wide forums on the subject to inform voters of its value.</p>
<p>I feel that the City Council should vote to restore the previous system. A compromise would be 7 direct districts, 3 at-large and one city-wide mayor. At least in that system, I would have 5 representatives to whom I could vote.</p>

Incumbents or candidates with name recognition won't necessarily recieve votes just because with so many seats to vote for you just do it to get it over with. Shoul theis be permitted to prevail, what will our City look like in the future?</p>
<p>I have not heard a good reason for going back to the 7-3-1 system except that is the way it use to be. What did not work in the last election? I will tell you special interest power was reduced.</p>
<p>I honestly have not given it that much thought. Since the new system just took effect last year, it seems too soon to say one way or the other that it is working or not.</p>

On the ranked choice question, I strongly oppose because elections in New York City, Alaska, and elsewhere using ranked choice have confused voters and led to a decrease in participation. Also, it often takes weeks for election officials to sort through the ballots and do the complex calculations. In one case in California, the system was so complex that election officials made a mistake and seated the wrong candidate for local office. Keep ranked choice out of Virginia Beach!

While staff generally did a good job designing this survey, the survey does not mention the fact that Virginia Beach has no election system for 2024. There is a misperception that the 10-1 system is the status quo, but the city attorney made clear to Council that the city charter must be changed between now and 2024. Further, that will require General Assembly approval. Had this context been provided, more voters would support a referendum to decide where to go next.

I strongly support a referendum because the voters ought to have a say on a system which could be used for decades.

While I am willing to consider ideas such as increasing the number of seats, I believe as many seats as possible should be elected by all voters in the city.

Ranked choice voting is a terrible idea because the system has confused voters in Alaska, Maine, and New York City. Further, it makes no sense to say that the voters who voted for the candidate with the least support get to choose the winner. For example, suppose in a City Council election 45 percent vote for A, 42 percent for B, and 13 percent for C then the voters for C get to choose the winner. That is unfair to the vast majority who preferred A or B. Instead, a better system would be a run off between A and B.

I strongly support a with rank choice voting. Whatever system is chosen needs to be implemented fresh and not keep representatives that were elected under a different system.

I Strongly Support the 10-1 District System, it should not be changed at this time. We can review the system over the next 2 election cycles. We can also review the district and make tweaks to the system as necessary. We are all familiar with the fact that no process is Perfect when first implemented and sometimes changes must be done, but now is not the time to make those changes. I disapprove of a referendum on the ballot as we have done that before, the people voted and the Legislators changed the will of the people in favor of what the legislators wanted.

I strongly support the 10-1 voting system because it gives citizens more of a voice and requires the candidate to reside in the district that they represent which rams they are more familiar with the daily needs and concerns of their district s. The share a common experience with their constituents.

I do support having one at-large city council member and school board member. They would

**Survey Methodology**

### ABOUT THE SURVEY

The City of Virginia Beach contracted with the University of Virginia's Weldon Cooper Center for Public Service to conduct the "Virginia Beach Community Input Election Survey" as part of a larger community engagement and legal review initiative during the spring of 2023. The purpose of this work is to inform the City as they consider the future of their local election system. The survey, in particular, was designed to assess Virginia Beach residents' perceptions of the local election system, including their preferences going forward. The Weldon Cooper Center's Center for Survey Research (CSR) oversaw the survey portion of this project.

The survey employed a mixed-mode and mixed-probability design. The probability address-based sample (ABS) was based on all households in Virginia Beach, and ABS sample members were contacted via postal mail following a mail-forward design with a delayed invitation to complete online. The probability sample provides the survey's basis for statistical inference to the Virginia Beach population. To ensure all Virginia Beach residents could voice their perspectives and participate in the survey, an open-source online version of the questionnaire was posted to the SpeakupVB website (and community engagement site hosted by the City of Virginia Beach) and available for any individual to complete; additionally paper questionnaires were available on request. Responses collected through the open-source survey are considered non-probability completions and are not included in analyses testing for statistical significance.

The sections below provide a discussion of the methodology used to carry out the survey, including details on how the questionnaire and sampling design were developed, the survey was administered, and the data were prepared, weighted, and analyzed.

### QUESTIONNAIRE DESIGN

Following discussions with the City of Virginia Beach and a review of other election feedback measures, the CSR team drafted the initial conceptual outline of the survey. Following this, CSR drafted the full survey questionnaire, which was then reviewed separately by each the UVA legal consultants and the City. This review was iterative with multiple versions shared and revised before reaching the final questionnaire, which is presented at the end of this appendix.

The final questionnaire consisted of five major sections, which asked about respondents' recent voting experiences, their views on the most recent 10-1 election system in Virginia Beach, their views on the prior 7-3-1 election system, their election system and voting preferences, and their demographic characteristics. The final questionnaire was formatted for paper and programmed online in Qualtrics. The questionnaire was translated into Spanish and Tagalog by Research Support Services Inc., a translation vendor specializing in survey design.

### SAMPLING DESIGN

As noted, the survey employed both probability and non-probability recruitment methods. The population of interest for the survey was Virginia Beach residents. The non-probability version of the survey was available to any Virginia Beach resident over 18 years old who was interested in

sharing their feedback with the City. The probability sampling method is described in detail below.

### **Probability Sample**

To reach the population of interest, CSR purchased an address-based sample of residential addresses from Dynata, Inc. (formerly known as SSI or Survey Sampling International), a nationally recognized vendor for scientific survey samples. The sample is based on the address lists compiled and maintained by the U.S. Postal Service. The sample excluded addresses identified by the post office as businesses, vacant or seasonal homes, and P.O. Box addresses. The sampling vendor appended names of household occupants to the addresses where those were known, using data from white pages telephone directories and other sources.

In an effort to maximize the number of completes from all areas of Virginia Beach and improve representativeness of responses, the sample was stratified based on the Census Bureau's Low Response Score (LRS) of Census tracts. The sample was drawn based on three stratum: Low response propensity, high response propensity, and middle or average response propensity. Households in the high response propensity stratum, which accounted for 20.5% of all Virginia Beach households, were sampled at a slightly lower rate (relative sample proportion of .888) since a high response is expected from households in that stratum. Households in the low response propensity stratum, which accounted for 20.1% of all Virginia Beach households, were sampled at a higher rate (1.156) in an attempt to increase representation in the survey data from historically undercounted households. Households in the middle response stratum were sampled at a rate of 1.00; this stratum accounted for 59.3% of all Virginia Beach households. A final random stratified sample of 4,500 households was drawn.

## **SURVEY ADMINISTRATION**

The survey launched on April 4<sup>th</sup>, 2023 with the mailing of an advance letter to the probability sample of 4,500 households; data collection for the probability sample closed on June 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2023. The open-source web survey launched on April 19<sup>th</sup>, 2023 and closed on May 31<sup>st</sup>, 2023. The probability data collection followed a confidential protocol to facilitate targeted follow-up to non-respondents and ability to track completions. The non-probability data collection followed an anonymous protocol. Greater detail across each mode of data collection is provided below.

### **Probability Data Collection**

The probability sample was contacted following a mail-forward design in which residents were first invited to complete the survey by paper and were later presented with a web option for participation. Table 1 presents the details of our mail-forward recruitment design, including the dates on which each communication was made.

CSR assigned a unique survey ID to each household in the sample. This ID was marked on each mailing (including the survey packets) and could be connected to respondents' names, mailing addresses, and responses. The survey IDs were retained so CSR could keep track of survey participation, remove duplicate responses, and tailor follow-up contacts to households who had not yet completed the survey.

CSR managed the tracking of responses and performed data entry for all paper completions. Data entry validation was performed on approximately 15% of submitted questionnaires.

### **Non-Probability Sample**

The City of Virginia Beach managed promotion of the non-probability, publicly available survey. Participants could access the public link to complete the questionnaire on the SpeakupVB website, hosted by the City. While the link was made available through the City, CSR hosted the online survey via their Qualtrics account and had exclusive privileges in viewing online responses. The City also provided paper versions of the questionnaire upon request. The City would then share a scanned copy of the completed paper questionnaire, which CSR entered alongside the other open source web responses. Any adult resident of Virginia Beach who was not included in the ABS sample was welcome to take the survey at their convenience.

The non-probability online survey was anonymous, meaning that no identifying information was collected from respondents. Respondents *were* asked to provide their zip codes.

## SURVEY RESPONSE

In total 2,112 survey responses were collected. This count includes probability and non-probability cases across both modes of data collection. The specific breakdowns by sample and mode are presented in Table 2 below. Probability responses were de-duplicated across the two modes of data collection to ensure only a single response per household was recorded. In instances when a household completed the questionnaire more than once, the first, most complete submission was accepted and subsequent entries dropped from the data file.

### Response Rate

Among the probability sample, 623 respondents submitted a usable questionnaire.<sup>1</sup> Following the American Association for Public Opinion Research (AAPOR) disposition codes and response rate calculations,<sup>2</sup> this number of completes yields an estimated response rate (RR4) of 13.4%. Table 3 presents the counts of final dispositions of all households from the probability sample using AAPOR disposition codes.

In addition to the 623 completions, seven individuals communicated with CSR that they were opting out of the survey. Fifteen additional, non-duplicate questionnaires were returned to CSR but received after the data collection window had closed. These 15 questionnaires are neither included in the final data file/analysis nor the response rate calculation. Three hundred sixty-seven households in the sample had bad mailing addresses and could not be reached. The mail sent to these 367 households was returned to CSR by the postal service and marked as undeliverable. Two households were tracked as not having an eligible respondent because they did not reside in Virginia Beach (the sampled address was a part-time vacation home).

## DATA PREPARATION

CSR carried out the data preparation for analysis, which required the labeling, cleaning, and merging of paper and online data across both sample types. While the probability and non-probability data were aggregated, the data were analyzed separately. A comparison of the two sample across all survey questions can be reviewed in Appendix B. All data preparation and analysis was carried out using SPSS Statistics.

### Weighting

As noted, the probability sampling design for the study included stratification across three strata as a means to increase representativeness across Virginia Beach. The stratum with the lowest response propensity was sampled at a higher rate while the high response propensity stratum was sampled at a lower rate. To produce accurate survey estimates of Virginia Beach as a whole, the probability data were weighted so that each household receives a weight inverse to its probability of selection under the specified sampling design. This weighted adjustment to accommodate the effects of the sampling design is known as base weighting, and was applied to the probability sample.

Once the base-weights were applied, an additional step known as post-stratification weighting was performed on the probability data. When surveying the general population, the demographic profile of the survey respondents rarely matches the profile of the population under study. To address this, post-stratification weighting adjusts the survey data to match the population on selected demographics. By doing so, representativeness of the sample data is improved. Further, to the extent that answers to survey questions are related to the demographic variables included in the weighting, these post-stratification adjustments also reduce biases in survey estimates.

For this study, CSR weighted the probability data on race, Hispanic/Latinx ethnicity, and local voting district. A statistical method called ‘rim weighting’ or ‘raking’ was used to adjust the sample proportions on this variable to closely approximate the population proportions on this

same demographic. A comparison of samples and the population across these weight variables are presented in Table 4 below.

The Virginia Beach population figures used in weighting and shown in these tables are from the U.S. Census Bureau’s American Community Survey (ACS) 5-year Estimates (2017-2021).

**Demographic Overview**

As seen in Table 5, gender fell in close alignment with the population of Virginia Beach across sample types. The age distribution indicates that around 35% of the respondents in the weighted probability sample were 70 years or older, with an additional 27% falling in the 60-69 age range. Approximately 17% of the respondents were in the 50-59 age group, while the

remaining ~20% were under the age of 50. These findings suggest that both the probability and non-probability samples exhibited a skew towards older age groups, a deviation from the overall population demographics.

Regarding household income, the weighted probability sample shows that approximately 16% of the respondents had a household income less than \$50,000, while about 17% fell in the \$50,000 to \$99,999 range. Approximately 23% had a household income between \$100,000 and \$149,999, and around 28% reported a household income of \$150,000 or more. These percentages diverge from the provided census data, suggesting overrepresentation of respondents with higher household incomes.

In terms of education, the weighted probability sample showcases approximately 1% of the respondents with less than a high school diploma, 7% as high school graduates or with a GED, 16% with some college education but no degree, 10% with an associate degree or trade, 28% with a bachelor's degree, and 29% with a master's, professional, or doctoral degree. These figures reveal variations in educational attainment among the respondents with overrepresentation of respondents with higher educational attainments..

Concerning housing, the weighted probability sample indicates that approximately 14% of the respondents were renters, while around 85% were homeowners. These proportions deviate from the census data, suggesting overrepresentation of homeowners in the analysis.

For complete frequencies of the probability sample, see Appendix A. For additional comparison between the probability and non-probability samples, see Appendix B.

### Margin of Error

The margin of error for the *probability sample*<sup>3</sup> is approximately +/- 4.3 percent at the 95 percent level of confidence. This means that if the survey was repeated with 100 different random samples, the results of the survey would be within 4.3 percentage points of the population mean in 95 out of those 100 iterations of the survey.

The margin of error is affected by the weighting of the probability data. The estimate of +/- 4.3 percent takes that design effect (1.19) from weighting into account. Note, that every question on the survey has its own margin of error. The overall calculation presented here is for a question

answered by all respondents with a 50-50 response distribution. Margins of error would be larger for questions answered by fewer respondents or for subgroups in the data. On the other hand, questions with a lopsided response pattern (e.g. an 80-20 response pattern) and answered by all respondents will have a smaller margin of error.

### ANALYSIS

CSR completed all of the analyses using SPSS. The analyses included frequency tables, which demonstrate the valid (i.e., excluding missing responses) and total percentages of survey respondents who chose each answer option for each question. Cross-tabulations were conducted to reveal whether respondents' answers to some questions statistically differed from one another dependent on their responses to other questions (including demographics).

As with all surveys, this one was limited in its ability to draw definitive conclusions about the population under study. Although we conducted careful sampling and weighting to provide a high-quality estimate of Virginia Beach residents' perspectives, surveys will always include a degree of unmeasured error, so the results should be interpreted with that in mind. 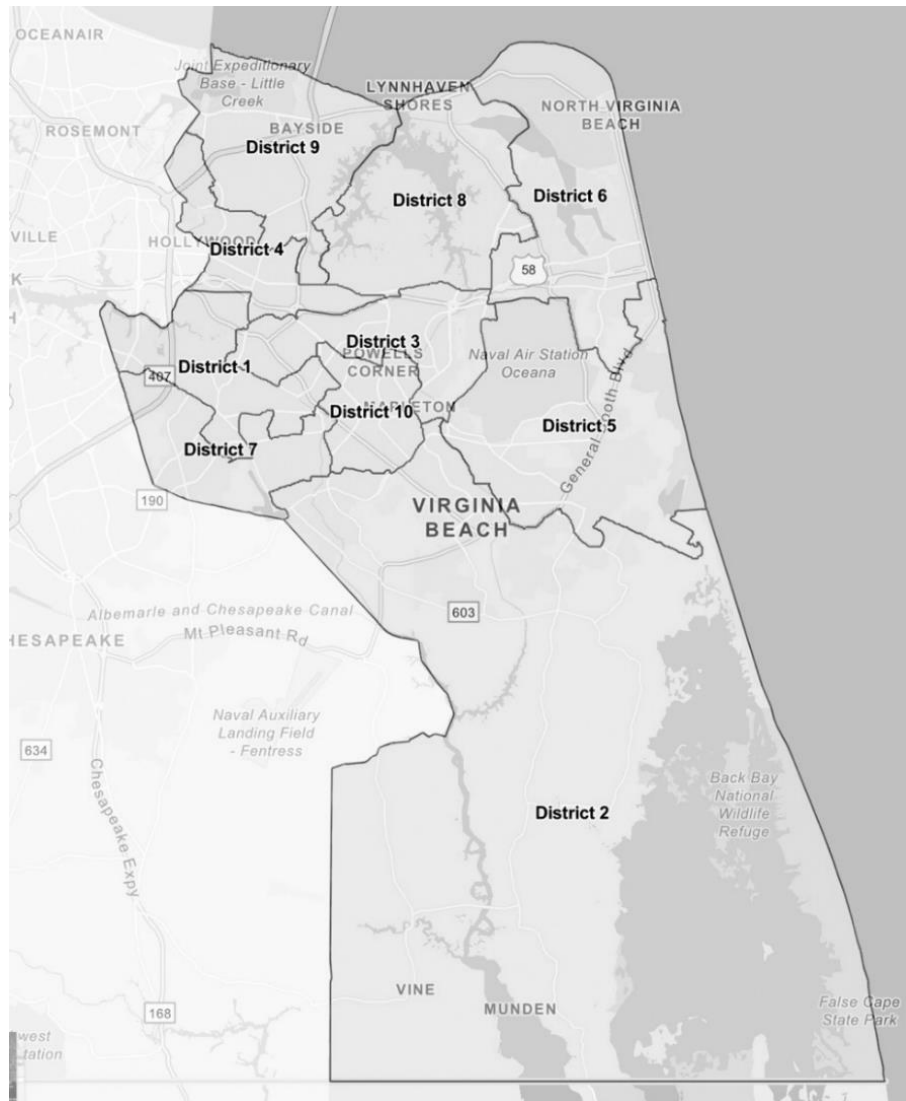
